## S5 BIOLOGY OUTING TO CHEUNG CHAU

#### **BURJAY 5B:**

## HOW DO YOU PREPARE FOR AN INTERVIEW?


While many people believe that interviews are hard to prepare for, I always encourage students to prepare by considering "high probability questions" they might encounter in an interview. There are three steps to this process.

First, put yourself in the shoes of the interviewer - what qualities are they looking for in a candidate? In addition to thinking from the interviewer's perspective, students could consider taking a look at the job posting or the university admissions page for additional hints.

Second, draft up a list of ~10 questions based on step one. In an interview, you would likely expect to give a self-introduction, explain your interest in the program (or job), share relevant experiences, and ask 2-3 good questions at the interview. Likewise, you may also want to consider the latest new developments in the program you are applying for.

Third, create bullet points for your responses and spend time rehearsing. I typically encourage students NOT to write out the entire script; the idea is to know your key points without sounding robotic. Ultimately, while students cannot expect to get all of their high probability questions in an interview, it provides added confidence when interviewers end up asking similar questions in the actual interview.

# WHAT ARE SOME INTERVIEW TECHNIQUES THAT COULD BE USED DURING AN INTERVIEW?









### HOW DO YOU WRITE A CV?

Nowadays, many CV templates are accessible online, providing good starting points for students who are creating their CVs. For students, a good template typically has the following components: a header with their full name and contact info, their educational details (including school grades and awards), extracurricular involvements (focusing on relevant experience and leadership commitments), and skills and hobbies section. Interested students could message Mr Yannick for a free template (I used to charge for these when I worked as a private admissions counselor, no jokes!)

## WHAT ARE SOME REMINDERS YOU WOULD LIKE TO GIVE OUR STUDENTS WHEN WRITING THEIR CVS?

There are two key reminders I'd like to share. First, a good CV has high impact bullet points that elaborate on key experiences. Many students explain what they've accomplished by summarizing what their club or activity does; however, this is unnecessary. Universities and employers want to know what YOU have done, focusing on YOUR contributions and responsibilities. Second, students need to take the time to proofread their CVs. Even after using my templates, students still make many formatting errors that can be easily fixed by proofreading their work. Attention to detail is extremely important on any job - and a good CV must show this.

# WHAT ARE SOME TIPS YOU WOULD LIKE TO GIVE TO STUDENTS WHO WANT TO APPLY ABROAD?

While it is hard to summarize strategies and tips for all overseas university applications, two general reminders might be of importance. First, if you look for an agent to help you out, make sure the agent is well-recognized. In the past, our very own GP students have been scammed by agents who provide questionable advice while extracting large sums of money from our students. If you are unsure, please approach your teachers and do further research to verify.

Second, I strongly discourage students from applying abroad to get into a "safety" program. It is incredibly expensive to study abroad: HK\$300,000 - HK\$500,000 a year that includes tuition fees, living expenses, travel expenses etc. Moreover, the few available scholarships are typically only offered by top universities. If you choose to study abroad, you should have an honest discussion with your family to consider the feasibility of doing so. After all, there are many great local programs in Hong Kong, including a great variety of exchange opportunities in which you pay the local HK tuition to go on an exchange term for half a year.
